




Obie's Story



kind-hearted rescuer found Obie, a scruffy dog, in a field by an industrial area. He couldn't leave him there, so he took him to his mother's house. She knew of HPPL and our mission to help strays, so she contacted us for help with the pathetic dog. When our vets examined Obie, they found he had a laceration over two inches long on one ear and a very bad infection

in both ears. He was malnourished, and as is common with dogs who haven't received any vet care, he was heartworm positive. Also, while his human fosters had kind and generous spirits, his foster dog siblings didn't take such a rosy view of having a new dog around. He was attacked by the woman's dogs, so he had some puncture wounds too. As if all this weren't enough, poor Obie came down with sarcoptic mange. Obie stayed in the hospital to be monitored carefully, and to get surgery for the abscesses on his elbows. He was on the road to recovery until he developed a mass on one of his toes, which was recently amputated. Fortunately the tumor was tested and was benign.

Obie may have been without hope, but luckily for him HPPL cares about each stray animal. Obie is now ready for his happy ending. He is a five-year-old male German Shepherd, probably a purebred, but his ears were so infected, they do not stand up anymore. He is a very large boy, weighing in around 110 pounds. He can be vocal at times, he loves people and certain dogs, and he's crate trained. No cats for Obie please. He has overcome ear infections, heartworm treatment, sarcoptic mange, and abscesses on both elbows and one toe. After all that, he maintains a sunny attitude and a zest for life.

While Obie was going through all these procedures, his foster mom needed surgery so she is no longer able to care for him. He needs another foster home, or better yet, a family looking for just such a wonderful new companion!

In a January 24 article in The Houston Chronicle, columnist Claudia Feldman quotes Kent Robertson, the new bureau chief at Houston's Bureau of Animal Regulation and Care, estimating that there are about 50,000 stray dogs in Houston, all needing care and attention. HPPL's mission has always been to focus on this segment of animals in need: strays with no owners to provide food, care, and love.

That's a lot of stray dogs, but HPPL is limited only by the number of foster homes and the amount of donations that come in. Please consider fostering a cat or a dog like Obie. You'll literally make all the difference in the world. If you'd like to think about it, contact us and we could let you speak with a current foster to get a better idea of what all is involved. Meanwhile, please pass Obie's info on to anyone you know who might have room in their heart for one big happy Shepherd.

Dogs Molly, Drea, Dino and Sam and cats Cavanaugh and Raja have all been adopted!







y sister, an HPPL volunteer, had talked for a couple of months about a sweet, little black cat named Lisa Marie that she had met. Lisa had been in the program for a long time, had some health issues (she has an immune deficiency illness Hemolytic Anemia), along with ulcers in her mouth, that made eating difficult and really needed a good home. Lisa was not in very good health, was very under weight and would need to be on medication for the rest of her life. I also heard of how hard it was to get her to take her medicine. I am a hard core dog lover and had never had a cat before. On Sept. 25, I made an appointment to meet her. I wasn't expecting much personality since she was so sick. Boy, was I wrong. I picked her up and we watched birds out the window while we waited to talk to Dr. Hennessey at Jersey Village Animal Hospital. We talked about what kind of care she would need, how to tell if she wasn't feeling well, and how to acclimate her to her new home with 3 big dogs. She came home with me that afternoon and met all the boys: Juneau and 2 other HPPL adoptees, Indiana and Smoochy. Now Lisa is a very happy, healthy, shiny, chubby cat. She takes less than half the dose of prednisone that was first prescribed for her (carefully hidden in some gourmet cat food), has no more ulcers and all her test results are within normal ranges. She spends most of her day sleeping on her queen-size bed, chasing balls, or sitting in the sun on her windowsill. In the evenings, she sits on my lap, tries to eat my dinner and watches TV with me. Then she curls up on my hip to go to sleep. She knows how to open the pantry door where the Pounce is kept and likes to crawl into cupboards and drawers. And to think I didn't even know I needed a cat.
