


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Going Forward



Can you believe it? Happy Anniversary! In 2019 HPPL celebrates 30 years of amazing dedication and devotion helping homeless cats and dogs.

Through the years HPPL has saved many animals with easy mends and sometimes amazingly difficult, costly ones. Every enrollee receives basic medical care before adoption day.

HPPL has been busy. Through October 2019, HPPL adopted out 86 animals (74 cats and 12 dogs). The Spay/Neuter program operated under the auspices of HPPL assisted in the altering and vaccination of 623 animals in 2019 (213 dogs and 410 cats).

In recent years HPPL has partnered with other organizations who work in different ways. It is our belief that it takes all of us to make a difference for our four footed friends.

PETS AND SENIORS

There are many ways seniors can interact with animals without taking on the responsibility of pet ownership. Here are a few ideas:* Volunteer at a rescue organization or animal shelter. Many rescue organizations and animal shelters could use an extra hand. Seniors can help provide care for animals, including feeding, watering, restocking supplies, washing dishes, walking dogs, cleaning cages and enclosures or socializing with the animals. Volunteers experience the benefits of interacting with pets, and they can provide some care to an animal in need. Get to know your neighbors' pets. Seniors who regularly walk their neighborhoods will likely see pet owners walking their dogs. Asking to join them for a walk might lead to new friendships with neighbors and dogs. Connect with a therapy animal. Pet Partners therapy teams, made up of a pet owner and his or her registered animal, go into many locations where seniors are living or being treated, such as hospitals, hospice centers and care communities. With so many options available, finding the right animal interaction for each individual should be as easy as a walk in the dog park. NewsUSA

How You Can Help



Pets on a Budget

It is possible to care for, even pamper, your pet on a budget or fixed income. By planning carefully and making smart shopping decisions, you can save money on food, toys and treats. - Save money on everyday essentials, such as pet food, by shopping at discount stores. Forty percent of the money Americans spend on pets is for food. Remember that you can save even more by buying private label food. Many private label products are equivalent to the national brands. - Find lower-cost medical care. Learn about clinics offered in your area, which can save you from expensive vet visits. Skip the pet day spa and groom your animal at home. You can save a lot of money by bathing and grooming your animal yourself. All you need to set up your own pet spa area are shampoo, conditioner, a brush or comb, a hair dryer and nail clippers. - Potty training and maintenance for pets can also be affordable. Discount stores offer cat litter, litter pans, scoops and liners. Puppy pads are available for puppies that are being trained. While buying the basics for your favorite animal, don't forget to pick up a toy or treat. Dogs love toys, snacks or rawhide bones. Cats enjoy exercising on a scratching post or munching on catnip.
